What is PIP & eligibility

- For people who need help taking part in everyday life or who find it difficult to get around.
- PIP is for the disabled person, not for a carer.
- PIP acts as a 'passport' for other types of help, such as the Motability Scheme see Appendix 2.
- PIP replaced DLA for adults
- Average assessment time peaked at 26 weeks in August 2021, but is currently around 16 weeks (Oct 2022)



Eligibility

Basic Qualifying Conditions

- Aged 16-64 when they claim
- (Unless terminally ill)
 Present in GB for
 104 / 156 weeks
- Habitually resident in the UK, Channel Islands, Rep of Ireland or Isle of Man

Disability Conditions

- Unless terminally ill:
 - Points scoring system
 - 'Qualifying period' of 3 months
 - Likely to continue to satisfy test for at least 9 months

The Social Security (Personal Independence Payment) Regulations 2013 No. 377





Claiming PIP

Two forms:

PIP1 questions look at if the person satisfies the basic qualifying conditions for PIP

PIP2 is lengthy but must be returned within one month (subject to any agreed extension).



Disability Conditions





10 Daily Living Activities

- 1. Preparing food
- 2. Taking nutrition
- 3. Managing therapy or monitoring a health condition
- 4. Washing and bathing
- 5. Managing toilet needs or incontinence
- 6. Dressing and undressing
- 7. Communicating verbally
- 8. Reading and understanding signs, symbols and words
- 9. Engaging with other people face to face
- 10. Making budgeting decisions

b	Needs to use an aid or appliance to be able to either prepare or cook a simple meal.	Score 2

е	Needs supervision or assistance to either prepare or cook a simple meal.	Score 4

Dressing and Undressing

b	Needs to use an aid or appliance to be able to dress or undress.	Score 2
C	Needs either	
	(i) prompting to be able to dress, undress or determine appropriate circumstances	
	for remaining clothed; or	
	(ii) prompting or assistance to be able to select appropriate clothing.	Score 2
d	Needs assistance to be able to dress or undress their lower body.	Score 2
е	Needs assistance to be able to dress or undress their upper body.	Score 4
f	Cannot dress or undress at all.	Score 8

Planning and Following Journeys

	Activity 1	
a	Can plan and follow the route of a journey unaided.	Score 0
b	Needs prompting to be able to undertake any journey to avoid overwhelming psychological distress to the claimant.	Score 4
С	Cannot plan the route of a journey.	Score 8
d	Cannot follow the route of an unfamiliar journey without another person, assistance dog or orientation aid.	Score 10
е	Cannot undertake any journey because it would cause overwhelming psychological distress to the claimant.	Score 10
f	Cannot follow the route of a familiar journey without another person, an assistance dog or an orientation aid.	Score 12



Moving Around

	Activity 2	
а	Can stand and then move more than 200 metres, either aided or unaided.	Score 0
b	Can stand and then move more than 50 metres but no more than 200 metres, either aided or unaided.	Score 4
С	Can stand and then move unaided more than 20 metres but no more than 50 metres.	Score 8
d	Can stand and then move using an aid or appliance more than 20 metres but no more than 50 metres.	Score 10
е	Can stand and then move more than 1 metre but no more than 20 metres, either aided or unaided.	Score 12
f	Cannot, either aided or unaided, (i) stand; or (ii) move more than 1 metre.	Score 12

Individual Circumstances

- 2 years
- 5 years
- 10 years
- Indefinite award






Appeals Process





The claimant's journey to an appeal hearing





During the Hearing

Purpose: Independent decision about the claimant's entitlement to PIP at the date of the original decision

The Tribunal Panel

- Tribunal chair (judge)
- Doctor
- Layperson with understanding of health conditions/disabilities

Who else?

- DWP representative
- Emotional support

Timings: Usually around 40 minutes



Submissions

Put the claimant in the best position possible

Address each of the PIP activities in dispute

Point the Tribunal to the relevant evidence in the bundle

Your aim: to not have to say anything during the hearing
